Some 20,000 African Americans in Tennessee—equivalent to 40% of the state's eligible black population—served in the Union Army during the Civil War. They fought with distinction, and their valor became a powerful symbol for future campaigns to win voting and civil rights. Their military experience presented them with unprecedented opportunities to elevate their political, economic, and social status; however, these aspirations rarely went uncontested. Dr. Coker, a Civil War scholar in the history department at the University of Tennessee, will discuss the experiences and contributions of these soldiers to the war and later efforts.
